Purpose of the grant request: \$23,090 funding request for the Kingsburg 4-H Club to maintain and expand community-based educational opportunities for youth ages 8-18. 4-H Members "learn by doing" from skilled adult volunteers in project areas like animal science, healthy living activities, cooking, agriculture, community service, and leadership.

Kingsburg 4-H Club has an annual membership of 70-100 youth, ages 8-18, and 18 adult volunteer project leaders.

Club Structure:

- Monthly Meetings: The 4-H Officer Leadership Team (made up of youth in 4th 8th grade) leads a monthly club meeting at Kingsburg Community Church.
- Project Groups: 4-H members choose individualized project groups throughout the year to focus their learning based on interest. Kingsburg 4-H offers the following project groups:
 - Animals: Sheep, Dairy Goats, Meat Goats, Horse/Hippology, Rabbits
 - Foods (cooking), Foods (baking), Foods (home arts), Outdoor Adventure, Woodworking, Small Engines, Crochet, Sewing, Floriculture, Rocketry, Public Speaking, Community Service, and Archery

All project groups meet for a minimum of 6 hours per year, but most groups meet for more time. Project groups are created by and led by local adult volunteers who have a special interest in a subject and choose to lead the group.

 Community Service: Several community service opportunities are scheduled year-round for all club members.

Our Project Groups empower youth to be healthy – body and mind – with the skills to make healthy decisions and lead healthy lifestyles. Having the confidence and skills to lead healthy lifestyles not only improves overall well-being, it enables youth to tackle life's challenges today and become leaders in their lives, careers, and communities as they grow into responsible adulthood.

Our animal science groups are some of the more popular project groups and help youth to gain a better understanding of the basics of sheep/goat/horse care and production, nutritional needs, how to keep the animals healthy, how to correct health problems, and more. Our club often has 20 or more members who show their animals at The Big Fresno Fair each year. Members participating in a 4-H animal science project are able to engage in science-based, hands-on education. Working with animals helps them feel connected to others, encourages outdoor exercise, teaches many life-skills, and boosts confidence.

4-H Youth learn how to lead lives that balance physical, mental, and emotional health. 4-H members learn essential life skills such as oral and written communication and decision-making. Youth participants strengthen their self-concept and character through interaction with peers and professionals from Kingsburg and different parts of the Central Valley and state.

Groups like Foods/Nutrition (cooking, baking and home arts), Woodworking, Rocketry, Archery and Sewing promote physical health with outdoor exercise, developing useful life skills, building healthy habits, and learning about nutrition. 4-H Youth see positive growth in their mental and emotional well-being when they learn to see the bigger picture of life and how they fit into their community. They also establish positive relationships with peers and adults. Participants practice knowledge and skills in a safe, supportive environment. Learning through mistakes and successes, kids enjoy the process and experiences along the way.

5. Community Need: Describe specific needs of the District which your project will meet.

1. Youth Health and Wellness Education and Leadership:

Local schools have limited time for extracurricular activities beyond ELA, Math, and Science. The Kingsburg 4-H Club provides healthy living educational project groups such as animal groups, foods, woodworking, and archery that allow for physical activity, new experiences, social interactions, and career exploration outside of the traditional school day. Kingsburg has many sports programs, but Kingsburg 4-H programs offer healthy, physical alternatives for youth.

Kingsburg 4-H provides opportunities to develop leadership skills as students create agendas for monthly meetings, form activity committees, and make written and verbal reports at monthly meetings.

Opportunities for youth in Kingsburg are limited and many families go to Fresno or Visalia for enrichment activities. Kingsburg 4-H provides a great local resource to the District.

The FFA (Future Farmers of America) program at Kingsburg High School is an active and thriving educational group. The Kingsburg 4-H Club introduces elementary and middle school students to the FFA curriculum and gives them confidence to join FFA as they enter high school.

2. Agricultural Education and Awareness:

Kingsburg is a blend of urban and rural living. Even with the close proximity of rural life, many children in Kingsburg are not exposed to the agricultural economy that surrounds them. Kingsburg 4-H raises awareness of and participation in the agricultural economy of the Central Valley. Students learn how food is grown, take tours of local agricultural businesses, and learn how animals are raised.

3. Community Awareness and Community Building:

Kingsburg 4-H works with KCAPS to complete community service projects like "adopting a shelf" in the KCAPS pantry and helping with their annual food drive. KCAPS gives a tour to the 4-H participants and educates them on the needs of others in the community. We participate in the KCAPS/Salvation Army Bell Ringing in December.

We also provide other community service opportunities like maintaining planters on Draper Street outside of the Village Mall and at the Kingsburg Train Depot. We have also partnered with the Train Depot to help with different events such as setting up model trains and decorating for Christmas.

Kingsburg 4-H brings families and individuals together from all different backgrounds and ages and provides a positive environment for them to interact, work together, and learn.

4. Health and Wellness Benefit to Adult Volunteers:

Children are not the only people who benefit from 4-H. Adult volunteers who help with the program benefit as well. Adult volunteers continue their education in their specialties when they prepare lessons and activities. Their interaction with the younger generations has a positive impact on the adults and children.

OULT records indicate that you are the regularly constituted state university of the State of California originally created by a state legislature act of 1868; that you are engaged ineducational activities; that your income "is derived from investments, endowments, tuition, and miscellaneous sources; and that your income is used in furtherance of your educational activities.

In addition, it appears from our records (including tHe information SP.bmitted with your letter of July 13, 1982), that there has been no change in your organization's exempt status. Accordingly, our letter of September 14, 1939 is still in effect.

This is in reply to a letter dated September 25, 2012, in which you requested rulings concerning the income tax consequences of certain proposed transactions.

Facts:

You are a land grant university organized primarily for educational purposes, and your primary missions are teaching, research, and public service. You have been determined to be exempt from federal income tax under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue

Your activities in furtherance of your exempt purposes include educational instruction to students from the undergraduate level to the most advanced graduate level. These activities are performed at 10 different campuses located throughout State.

You represent that the Club program in State is overseen by you through Division. Division oversees all of the activities of the Club, including a list of separately charted activities bearing the Club name and emblem. In order to bear such name each activity must be approved by Agency, an agency of the federal government. None of the separate activities of Club is independently organized as a separate legal entity.

You conduct the Club program in conjunction with Agency, which also provides financing for the program. You represent that you will conflue to operate Club activities as part of your operations, in this same member as you operate academic courses, athelic events, and scientific research. You state that all the county directors in Dussion are your employees and that the directors are responsible for the activities follow your university wide policies. You also ensure that the Club activities follow your university wide policies. You also represent that you will keep recorde of Club activities to ensure that all Club funds are used for scalion 501(c)(3) purposes. You require all Club_activities to provide you with annual financial reports.

On your behalf, <u>Division</u> supervises several different types of <u>Club</u> activities, including camping programs, affar-school clubs, and community clubs. The <u>Club</u> activities are open to all young persons within <u>Stalla</u>, and are organizated to impart to the participants the skills that they will need as adults. The focus of the <u>Club</u> is to promote positive youth development through educational programs directed at (i) science, engineering, and technology; (ii) healthy thing, (iii) clubzeriship; and (iv) beadership. The <u>Club</u> program achieves its educational goals through various mathods, including project-based, experiential, and collaborative methods. All <u>Club</u> disesses are taught by highly-trained starf and volunteers.

You treat II Qub activities as your activities. You require all the Club chapters to provide you with annual Qub financial reports. Qub, chapter financial reports are summarized and submitted to the <u>Division's Office, which reviews his summary reports and posts the summarized reformation to the <u>University general</u> ledger.</u>

You provide adknowledgment letters to <u>Oligit</u> donors. In those letters, you inform donors that you have full ownership of all gifts made to you for the benefit of <u>O</u>ligits, Indicate that you have full ownership of all gifts made to you for the benefit of <u>O</u>ligits, Indicate whether any goods or services were provided in consideration for the donated funds, and, if so, provide a description and good faith estimate of the value of those goods or services.

Because you are a governmental unit, you are not required to lite any Form 990 series information return. However, you have stated that you will report on Form 990-T all unrelated business income and expenses in connection with <u>Cub.</u> programs.

Rulings Requested:

- Conflibutions made to University that are designated for Club activities or related organism may be adductable as chartlable contributions, subject to the requirements and limitations of section 170.
- <u>University's</u> operation of <u>Club</u> activities will not adversely effect University's bax-exempt status under section 501(c)(3).

I.R.C. § 901(c)(3) provides for the exemption from federal Income tax of an organization organized and operatued exclusively for purposes described in section 501(c)(3), including educational purposes.

Treas. Reg. § 1.501(c)[9.1(a)(1) provides that in order to be exempt under section 501(c)(3) of the Code, an organization must be both organized and operated exclusively for one or more of the exempt purposes specified in that section.

Treas. Rag. § 1.50f (c)(3)-1(c)(1) states an organization will be regarded as operated exclusively for one or more exempt purposes only if languages primarily in activities which accomplish one or more of such exempt purposes. An organization will not be so regarded if more than an insubstantial part of its activities is not in furtherance of an exempt purposes.

Treas, Ray, § 1.501(c)(3)+1(d)(3) defines educational as the Instruction or braining of the individual for the purpose of importing or developing the capabilities, and the instruction of the public on subjects useful to the individual and beneficial to the community.

I.R.C. § 170(a)(1) allows, subject to certain limitations, a deduction for charitable contributions as defined in section 170(c), payment of which is made within the daxable year and verified under regulations prescribed by the Secretary.
